How did you respond to the characters in the text? Explain.

In Speak, I hated the supporting characters for ignoring Melinda's depression and I felt this was an injustice to her. Characters in this text judge Melinda's muteness as rude and rebellious, and do not see it at a means of her coping with her depression. Mr. Neck, one of her teachers, is the personification of judgment. I felt so angry with Mr. Neck, who as a teacher has been trained to support young people, for being so obtuse and refusing to be understanding. It is people like this that further put people into depression, as they will further feel as though they are misunderstood, as Melinda did after this incident "Why does everyone want me to talk? Maybe, I have nothing to say....I am nothing".

What did you learn from this text?

The text taught me that offering a willing ear is often what people with depression need. Depression often makes people feel like nobody wants to hear what they say. I learned how Melinda feels that nobody will care about what she is feeling and what is on her mind, even if she were to tell people. This resonated deeply for me as I saw all Melinda wanted was for someone to listen to her. If those around a person like Melinda were to open their minds to see what was eating away at this person, their condition would be much more manageable for them. However, it cannot be assumed that your pain and thoughts are being picked up by the people around you, because what is clear to you may not be clear to others. You must speak. In the story, Melinda realizes this and tells her best friend about her depression and rape. In our society, the silence behind mental health must also be broken.

At the end of this novel Pi has run aground in Mexico and is being questioned about the sinking of the cargo ship by two executives. He tells of his extraordinary story yet the executives do not believe him. Pi then offers and alternate story in which the orang-utan is Pi's mother, the hyena is the ship's cook, the zebra is a sailor and Pi is Richard Parker, the Bengal tiger. I found this explanation that Pi gave to the executives extremely enthralling because it made me look at the whole novel in a totally different light.

Did you find this text convincing? Explain why or why not.

Throughout the novel the animals on the lifeboat were just that; they behaved just as you would expect a wild animal to act in a distressing situation. The hyena kills and eats both the zebra and orang-utan and then Richard Parker kills the hyena. I found this unsurprising as both hyenas and tigers are predatory animals and for them to attack another animal, let alone in a survival situation, was expected to me.
