- 1. What words are used in stanza one to give the santé bar slightly illicit connotations?
- 2. Remembering that this poem is about a prejudice atmosphere in NZ, what could "chocolate dust was in the air" relate to?
- 3. Write down the lines that show us why the narrator is remembering these incidents.
- 4. Find a metaphor used in the third stanza that explains why Mila wasn't the victim of racism. What does the metaphor mean?
- 5. An allusion is a reference to another place, person or event in a text. Find an allusion in stanza five. What is it alluding to? How does it relate to an idea in the poem?
- 6. What effect does the line "what does lynching mean maka?" have? How is it more powerful coming from a child?
- Dialogue (characters speaking in a text) isn't always in quotation marks. Find an example of dialogue in stanza 9. Who is speaking to whom?
- 8. Find the pun in stanza 9. What effect does it create?
- 9. Stanza 10 begins differently to the ones before it. How does it start differently?
- 10. Read the metaphor "I'm the cream rising to the top". Who is the cream? Who is the coffee?
- 11. Think about how coffee could be seen as representing NZ urban (city) culture. What does this say about how Mila see herself?
- 12. "Red neck" in stanza 14 refers to racist people from the southern US. How is contrast used in the line "who is this redneck with the big brown shoulders"?
- 13. Analepses (flashbacks) are used throughout this poem. Why did Mila decide to use them?
